Special Education

"Specially designed instruction, at no cost to the parents, to meet the unique needs of a child with a disability, including instruction conducted in the classroom, in the home, in hospitals and institutions and in other settings; and instruction in physical education, and including the terms specified in the federal regulations at 34 C.F.R.300.39"

6 Principals of IDEA

Individuals with Disability Education Act

- FAPE (Free Appropriate Public Education)
- IEP (Individualized Education Program)
- LRE (Least Restrictive Environment)
- Parent & Student Participation in Decision Making
- Appropriate Evaluation
- Procedural Safeguards (Your Rights)



FAPE

Free Appropriate Public Education

Special education and related services provided to the student as described in the Individual Education Program.

- Provided at no cost to parents
- Must meet standards of Ohio Department of Education
- Includes an appropriate preschool, elementary, high school education

IEP

Individualized Education Program

- Outline of educational program
 - Goals and objectives for the student (must be measurable)
 - Outlines supports and services needed
 - Specific individuals are required to attend IEP meetings
 - Must be reviewed at least once a year



LRE

Least Restrictive Environment

- Last decision the IEP team should make
- Educated with nondisabled peers
- Placement may be outside the school building
 - Home
 - Hospital
 - Residential Placement

Parent & Student Participation

Areas parent and student should participate in:

- Referral
- Evaluation
- Eligibility Determination
- IEP Development
- Placement
- Disciplinary Actions



Appropriate Evaluation

A variety of assessment methods must be used to gather information about how your child is developing, learning and functioning.

- Test must be reliable
- Must be given in native language or mode of communication
- Test must be given by a trained individual
- Measure more than intelligence, what are the educational needs of the child
- Right to request an IEE (Independent Educational Evaluation)

Request for Evaluation

- Written request for an evaluation in areas of suspected disability
- Provide information for the evaluation process (medical, family & educational history)
- Express your child's strengths and areas of need



Eligibility Timeline

120 days from date of referral

- District has 30 days to determine if they will evaluate your child
- 60 days to complete the evaluation
- 30 days to have the IEP in place, if the child is found eligible for Special Education services



Eligibility Categories

- 1. Autism
- 2. Metal Retardation
- 3. Deaf-blindness
- 4. Deafness
- 5. Emotional Disturbance
- 6. Hearing Impaired
- 7. Multiple Disabilities
- 8. Orthopedic Impairment
- 9. Other Health Impaired
- 10. Specific Learning Disability
- 11. Traumatic Brain Injury
- 12. Visual Impairment



Conflict Resolution

IDEA provides parents ways to resolve conflict

- Administrative Review
- Mediation
- IEP Facilitation
- State Complaint
- Due Process



Procedural Safeguards

Procedures established in federal and state law and regulations that protect the rights of children with disabilities and their parents in regard to a child receiving a free appropriate public education.
